FAIRS Export Certificate Report

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Report Highlights:

This is the first FAIRS - Certification Report for South Africa. The report lists major certificates and permits required to export food and agricultural products to South Africa. It is recommended that this report be read with the FAIRS – Narrative Report (<u>Click here to download the 2015 report</u>) for a much more comprehensive understanding of the South African regulations and standards.

SOUTH AFRICA: FOOD AND AGRICULTURAL IMPORT REGULATIONS AND STANDARDS (FAIRS) CERTIFICATION

This report was prepared by the USDA - Foreign Agricultural Services in Pretoria, South Africa for U.S. exporters of domestic food and agricultural products. While every possible care was taken in the preparation of this report, information provided may not be completely accurate either because policies have changed since its preparation, or because clear and consistent information about these policies was not available. It is highly recommended that U.S. exporters verify the full set of import requirements with their foreign customers, who are normally best equipped to research such matters with local authorities, before any goods are shipped.

FINAL IMPORT APPROVAL OF ANY PRODUCT IS SUBJECT TO THE IMPORTING COUNTRY'S RULES AND REGULATIONS AS INTERPRETED BY BORDER OFFICIALS AT THE TIME OF PRODUCT ENTRY.

SECTION I: INTRODUCTION

United States exporters should note that the South African export permits, namely, the Veterinary Health Certificate and Phytosanitary Permit are country and commodity specific. It is recommended that exporters contact the certifying authority on the contact details provided in Table 2 to obtain the United States and commodity specific conditions for each permit. Some examples of the certificates are shown in Appendix I. Alternatively, these certificates and conditions are also provided on the United States Department of Agriculture - Animal and Plant Health Inspection Services (APHIS) website on the following links, Click here for animal and animal products permits or Click here for plant and plant products permits.

Animals and animal products

In terms of Section 6 of the Animal Diseases Act, 1984 (Act 35 of 1984), an import permit and veterinary health certificate are required when exporting animal and animal products to South Africa. The DAFF Directorate: Food Import and Export Standards in the Animal Health Division is responsible for issuing the import permits. Veterinary import permits are usually issued within 5 to 10 working days, under normal circumstances. The application forms for import permits can be obtained on the following link; http://www.daff.gov.za/daffweb3/Branches/Agricultural-Production-Health-Food-Safety/Animal-Health/importexport/forms.

The veterinary health certificate can be issued by a recognized veterinary authority of the exporting country. The veterinary health certificate needs to be completed before departure and within 10 days of departure, in English. The Animal and Plant Health Inspection Services (APHIS) provides inspection and certification services to United States exporters. The procedures and requirements for exporting animals and animal products from the United States to South Africa can be obtained on the following APHIS website; Click this link to the APHIS webpage.

South Africa will usually specify any other documentation e.g. Indemnity Declaration, Rabies Vaccination Certificate required prior to or when issuing the import permit. South Africa will only allow import of animal and animal products from abattoirs and de-boning plants approved by the Director of Animal Health in terms of the Meat Safety Act, (Act no 40 of 2000). Plant and Plant Products

In terms of the Agricultural Pests Act, 1983 (Act No. 36 of 1983) some plant commodities require an import permit, while others are exempt from an import permit but have to comply with phytosanitary measures for such exemption. The DAFF Directorate of Plant health is responsible for issuing import permits. The procedures to be followed when importing plant and plant products can be obtained from the following link;

Liquor Products

The Quality Audit division, of the DAFF Directorate of Food Safety and Quality Assurance is responsible for the inspection, sampling of liquor products and issuing of Import Certificates. An Import Certificate is required in order to import a liquor product, in bulk/ bottles, (excluding beer) to South Africa. An Importer is only required to apply for an Import Certificate only once in the lifetime of a product, after that the same Import Certificate number can be used provided that the composition, content, bottle size and label of that product doesn't change. An acceptable Analysis Certificate, issued by an Official Laboratory in the country of origin, is usually requested when applying for an import permit, and if provided certain fees are exempted during the application. At least 48 hours' notice must be given to the Quality Audit division every time a consignment of liquor, for which an Import Certificate has been issued, will enter this country.

Genetically manipulated organisms (GMOs)

The DAFF Biosafety directorate is responsible for issuing GMO import permits, GMO status certificates, as well as the use, trials, commodity use permit (food, feed or processing) and commodity clearance for GMOs.

SECTION V: OTHER CERTIFICATION/ACCREDITATION REQUIREMENTS

Certificate of Origin

The South African Declaration (or certificate) of Origin, Form DA-59, certifying the country of origin, description of goods, weight, etc, is required for shipments of some foodstuffs. South African Customs

will notify the importer if a Form DA-59 is required and the importer will notify the exporter. When the form is required, exporters or suppliers must provide at least one original signed copy attached to the original commercial invoice.
